I would like to offer a warm welcome to all Bio Olympiad participants, honored dignitaries, friends in academia and foreign guests. It is truly a pleasure to be at such an unique event. As the President&CEO of User Corp, I would like to extend the blessing of the organization for such a gathering, it truly is in the spirit of applying the Kyoto Protocol as well as bolstering the Copenhagen Accord.

While many of you perhaps do not know me, I can say that unequivocally I know who you are; you *ARE* the future leaders of the planet. You ARE the individuals that will change the world when it comes to global environmental policy and you ARE the generation that will be most affected by climate change. When I look out among this sea of faces I am struck by one thing, the youthful ages of the participants. I see school aged children all the way up to university students, all of whom have come together today for the purpose of creating solutions to the environmental challenges that face us. While I know your task is not easy, the youthful aspect of the conference gives me hope, to know that all of you are working to tackle perhaps one of the most serious threats humans will ever have to face, global climate change.

While reading the article, I was saddened by the event because it truly was a national emergency of extreme proportion; it also was indicative of perhaps the events that all countries, even my own will inadvertently see in the future. As I was scrolling down the page, I stopped at a picture of a soldier walking by birch trees in the city of Voronezh. The trees were burned along their trunks yet had not succumbed to the fire itself. They were wounded but managed to persevere in the midst of such a disaster. As I think about the Bio Olympiad in my mind, I see a bit of all BIO participants in this picture. It is true that we have been slightly scared by the present effects of climate change but our strength, perseverance and desire to combat these changes will show how just like the trees of Voronezh we are resilient and will meet this challenge!
